Announcement of the First Annual Meeting and Call for Papers

The first annual meeting of the Midwestern Association of Parasitologists will be held on Monday and Tuesday, June 20 and 21, 1949 on the campus of the University of Wisconsin, Madison, Wisconsin.

Formal papers will not be read at the scientific sessions as agreed upon at the time the society was organized last December in New Orleans. All papers will be presented informally by demonstration so that all may have ample opportunity to discuss methods and results of research on a personal basis.

Abstracts of material to be presented should be in the hands of the secretary not later than May 31, 1949. If possible abstracts will be mimeographed for distribution at the meeting. Please submit your abstracts, typewritten, double-spaced, and with 300 words or less.

The University of Wisconsin Residence Halls indicate they can provide sleeping quarters for most of the group at about two dollars a night. Reservations for these rooms should be made with the secretary as soon as possible.

SECOND ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF MIDWESTERN PARASITOLOGISTS

Organization adopted June 21, 1949

The Annual Conference of Midwestern Parasitologists shall comprise all interested parasitologists resident in the general midwestern region of the United States and Canada, for the purpose of occasional meetings with informal presentation, demonstration and discussion of researches in the field of parasitology.

Membership shall be available to all interested persons. There shall be no dues but a registration fee of \$.50 may be assessed at the regular meetings. Without fixing definite boundaries or barriers, the area served shall include in general the states of Michigan, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Iowa, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Kentucky and Missouri.

The officers shall be a presiding officer and a secretary-treasurer to be elected by the membership at a general meeting or by mail ballot. The terms of office shall be one year for the presiding officer and two years for the secretary-treasurer. For each meeting the presiding officer shall appoint a local committee on arrangements and program. The secretary-treasurer shall insure call for titles of paper, and demonstrations to be presented at each meeting.

GENERAL STATEMENT OF OBJECTIVES AND ORGANIZATION

OF MIDWESTERN PARASITOLOGISTS

(adopted June 21, 1949)

The Annual Conference of Midwestern Parasitologists shall comprise all interested professional parasitologists and students resident in the general midwestern region of the United States and Canada, for the purpose of occasional meetings with informal presentation, demonstration and discussion of researches in the field of parasitology.

Membership shall be available to all interested persons. A registration fee of 50 cents will be charged at the meetings.

Without fixing definite geographical boundaries or barriers, the area served shall include the States of Michigan, Wisconsin, Iowa, Minnesota, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio, Kentucky and Missouri.

The officers of the Midwestern Parasitologists shall be a presiding officer and a secretary-treasurer to be elected by the membership at a meeting of the society or by mail ballot. The term of office for the presiding officer shall be one year and for the secretary-treasurer two years.

For each meeting the presiding officer shall appoint a local committee on arrangements and program.

The secretary-treasurer shall insure call for titles of papers and demonstrations to be presented at each meeting.

## THE ANNUAL MIDWESTERN CONFERENCE OF PARASITOLOGISTS

### Objectives and Organization

A revision of statements approved in 1949 and in 1953 for incorporating subsequent amendments approved by the Conference.

#### Name

The organization shall be known as the ANNUAL MIDWESTERN CONFERENCE OF PARASITOLOGISTS, hereinafter referred to as the Conference.

#### Affiliation

The Conference is an affiliate of the American Society of Parasitologists.

#### Objectives

The Conference is a gathering of parasitologists and students of parasitology for the purpose of informal discussion of research and teaching in parasitology and the furthering of the best interests of the discipline of parasitology.

#### Members

The Conference is open to all interested persons regardless of place of work, residence, or affiliation in other recognized societies.

#### Dues

No regular dues are collected but a registration fee of fifty (50) cents is charged members during registration at annual meetings.

#### Meetings

The Conference is held in the general midwestern area in mid-June unless otherwise specified by a majority vote of the previous Conference or a majority vote of those listed members replying by mail ballot.

#### Administration

1. A simple majority vote of members in attendance at regularly scheduled business meetings of the Conference shall determine the policies of the Conference.

2. The officers are a Presiding Officer, whose term of office is one year or until his successor is elected (normally his term would expire with the adjournment of the annual Conference over which he presides); a Secretary-Treasurer, whose term of office is two years or until his successor is elected; and a Policy Committee composed of the last five available retired Presiding Officers plus, ex officio and without vote, the current Presiding Officer and Secretary-Treasurer. The term of office of each full member of the Policy Committee is five years, or so long as he is one of the five most recent, available Presiding Officers. The most recent past Presiding Officer available is the Chairman of the Policy Committee and the Vice-Presiding Officer of the Conference.

3. The Presiding Officer and the Secretary-Treasurer are elected by a majority vote of those members attending a regularly scheduled business meeting of the Conference or by a majority vote of those replying to a mail ballot of the membership.

4. The Presiding Officer shall preside at all meetings of the Conference, and shall be responsible for the program of the Conference. Thus he shall arrange for a banquet speaker and appoint a local, ad hoc committee in conjunction with which he shall develop the program of the Conference.

On the first day of the Annual Meeting he shall appoint the following committees which shall serve until they have reported on the last day of the meeting: (1) Nominating Committee, (2) Committee to Recommend the Next Meeting Place, (3) Committee to Suggest Program Possibilities for Future Meetings, (4) Resolutions Committee, and such other ad hoc committees as may be required.

He shall appoint the Conference Representative for the Council of the American Society of Parasitologists for the year following his tenure of office and serve as a member without vote of the Policy Committee.

5. The Secretary-Treasurer shall issue a call for participants in the program for each meeting; inform the new Presiding Officer of his duties and the members of the Policy Committee of their tenure and Secretary of the American Society of Parasitology within three weeks after the annual election; serve as member without vote and Secretary of the Policy Committee; and supervise all funds of the Conference.

6. The Policy Committee shall determine by majority vote all matters of procedure and policy pertaining to the Conference upon which decision must be reached between consecutive Conferences as well as all matters referred specifically to it by the membership. Such a vote may be requested by any member of the Conference but must be directed through the Secretary-Treasurer. The Chairman of the Policy Committee shall request the approval of the membership for all decisions of the Committee at the earliest subsequent business meeting of the Conference.
