Minutes of the first business meeting, June 11, 1956; Zoology Building, State University of Iowa, Iowa City, Iowa.

The meeting was called to order by Presiding Officer
William D. Lindquist, and Dr. James E. Ackert was requested to
address the assembly. Dr. Ackert dedicated the Eighth annual
meeting to the memory of Dr. Chester A. Herrick, deceased,
University of Wisconsin. Dr. Ackert discussed the personal life
and career of Dr. Herrick from the standpoint of teacher, friend
and colleague. He presented a resolution of dedication prepared
jointly with Dr. A. C. Walton.

The Conference stood in silence in memory of Dr. Herrick.

A floor resolution that the Secretary be instructed to send the memorial statement to Dr. Herrick's family was seconded and unanimously passed. The Secretary was so instructed.

Reports of the standing committees were called for but, in the absence of vital or new considerations, were not presented.

Dr. Lindquist appointed a meeting place committee of Drs. Mizelle, Chairman, Hoffman and Otto; a Nominating Committee of Drs. Levine, Chiman, Lewert and Vaughn; and a Program Committee of Drs. Ulmer, Chiman, Clark and Kruidenier.

Dr. Lindquist called for new business.

Officers of the Conference, on a rotational basis. The Chairman

preceding year. A permanent, responsible policy committee would
thus be established. The current council would include Drs.

The motion was seconded by Ulmer and passed unanimously.

Mr. Hogar Matson, Denmark and Dr. Rocha, Brasil were introduced.

Dr. Richard Porter suggested that the Conference plan to meet at one of the available biological stations. His suggestion was directed to the Committee on Meeting Places.

Dr. Lysenko, Wisconsin, moved that a resumee of Dr. Herrick career be prepared by Dr. Ackert and submitted for publication to the Journal of Parasitology on behalf of the Midwestern Conference

Dr. Ackert requested that Dr. Lysenko co-author this memorial.

The motions were seconded and unanimously adopted.

Dr. Lindquist adjourned the meeting after appropriate floor action.

The second business meeting was called to order at 11 a.m., June 12, 1956, in the Shambaugh Auditorium.

The Treasurer's report was presented and approved.

The Nominating Committee recommended Dr. J. E. Ackert as Presiding Officer for 1957. It was moved, seconded and unanimously voted that Dr. Ackert act as Presiding Officer for 1957.

Dr. Mizelle, Meeting Place Committee, recommended that the Conference consider the University of Michigan Biological Station at Cheboygan, Michigan and the University of Michigan School of Public Health in Ann Arbor as possible meeting sites for the 1957 Conference. Floor discussion was inconclusive. The Secretary was directed to poll the membership by mail.

Dr. Ulmer, Program Committee recommended that the program be held in abeyance until the meeting place was determined because of the obvious necessity for correlation. It was so voted.

No new business was brought to the floor and the meeting was adjourned with a vote of appreciation and thanks to the local committee of Dr. Nolf and his students for the splendid accommodations afforded the Conference.
