

Report of the Secretary-Treasurer 1962

Minutes: Thirteenth Annual Midwestern Conference of Parasitologists,  
Ohio State University, June 12-13, 1961.

First Business Meeting

Presiding Officer, Dr. Norman D. Levine, called the meeting to order at 4:15 p.m., June 12, 1961, and asked for approval of minutes for the 12th AMCOP and the financial report. Both were approved.

Dr. Levine announced the 1961-1962 Policy Committee as: N. D. Levine, Chairman; F. J. Kruidenier; G. F. Otto; G. R. LaRue; and J. E. Ackert. The Secretary-Treasurer will also be a member of the Policy Committee and the new Presiding Officer will serve ex officio.

Presiding Officer Levine asked Dr. Kruidenier to comment on the preparation of the Conference's statement of "Objectives and Organization". Dr. Kruidenier stated that this statement was prepared and will be sent out soon.

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Discussion was opened for opinions on time of year the AMCOP meetings should be held since ASP will meet occasionally in June. Comments were as follows:

Kruidenier - Demonstrations could be held if AMCOP and ASP met together.

Walton - Believe the continuity of AMCOP meetings should continue.

Thomas - Washington, D.C., is hot in June.

Lindquist - Meeting with ASP defeats the purpose of AMCOP. Informality and graduate student participation might be lost if meeting held with ASP.

Gaafar - Should meet separately with smaller group.

Bangham - Supported Gaafar.

Kruidenier - The AMCOP needs to set a precedent by meeting separately.

Leland - Has AMCOP received an invitation for 1962?

Bemrick - Yes. Nebraska.

Dr. Walton moved that AMCOP maintain the customary meeting separate from ASP.

Dr. Gaafar seconded. Motion carried.

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Various times were suggested for the 14th meeting. An informal vote was taken and the majority preferred a time before or after the June ASP meeting.

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Dr. Levine commented on the Moulder and Griffith bills on use of animals for research.

Dr. L. J. Thomas made the motion that AMCOP go on record as being opposed to the M & G bills.

Robert Ogren seconded -- after some discussion, motion carried.

Dr. Levine appointed a committee (Secretary, Chairman, L. J. Thomas, and E. J. Robinson) to prepare a letter to the appropriate Congressional Committee stating the reasons AMCOP opposes the animal care bills.

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Dr. Levine opened discussion on the possibility of an award to a graduate student for preparation of an outstanding demonstration at AMCOP meetings.

#### Discussion:

Thomas - In favor of award -- award should be an aid in defraying expenses.

Kruidenier - Such an award(s) is given by Society of Mammalogy (approx. \$100).

Lindquist - Asked Dr. Kruidenier, as chairman of Policy Committee, to present opinions from the members of this committee.

Kruidenier - Depends on a continued income. Too many awards for students now.

Robinson - Award should be large enough to create considerable interest; \$25 is too little

Ogren - Moved: To approve in principle an annual award to a graduate student for preparation of an outstanding demonstration at AMCOP.

Seconded. Not carried.

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General: Dr. Venard commented on Banquet Preparation and gave general directions to places of interest.

Dr. Lindquist moved for adjournment. All were in favor.

#### Banquet - June 12, 1961

Guests were introduced by Dr. Levine. Dr. R. M. Kaufman, Dean of Agriculture at Ohio State University, gave an interesting review and history of O.S.U.

The evening speaker, Dr. Benjamin Schwartz, gave a most inspiring talk on "Parasitology: Old and New".

#### Second Business Meeting

Meeting called to order June 13, at 8:30 a.m. Presiding Officer Levine called for reports from the ad hoc committees.

Nominating Committee: F. J. Kruidenier, Chairman

Nominations were: For Presiding Officer - George Kelley  
Stanley Leland

Voting was by written ballot and  
George Kelley was elected.

For Secretary-Treasurer - David Clark  
A. C. Walton moved that a unanimous  
ballot be cast. Seconded. Carried.

Meeting Place Committee: George Kelley, Chairman

George Kelley moved that the 1962 meeting (14th) be held at Lincoln, Nebraska, May 25-26. Seconded. Carried.

The committee recommended that the 1963 meeting be held at the University of Minnesota, St. Paul.

Program Committee: Max McCowen, Chairman

The committee recommended that demonstrations be available for reviewing all day rather than for an afternoon. If possible, an announcement of demonstrations should be sent to members of AMCOP before the meeting. Major professors should encourage graduate students to participate.

There will be a Symposium on some aspect of parasite physiology.
