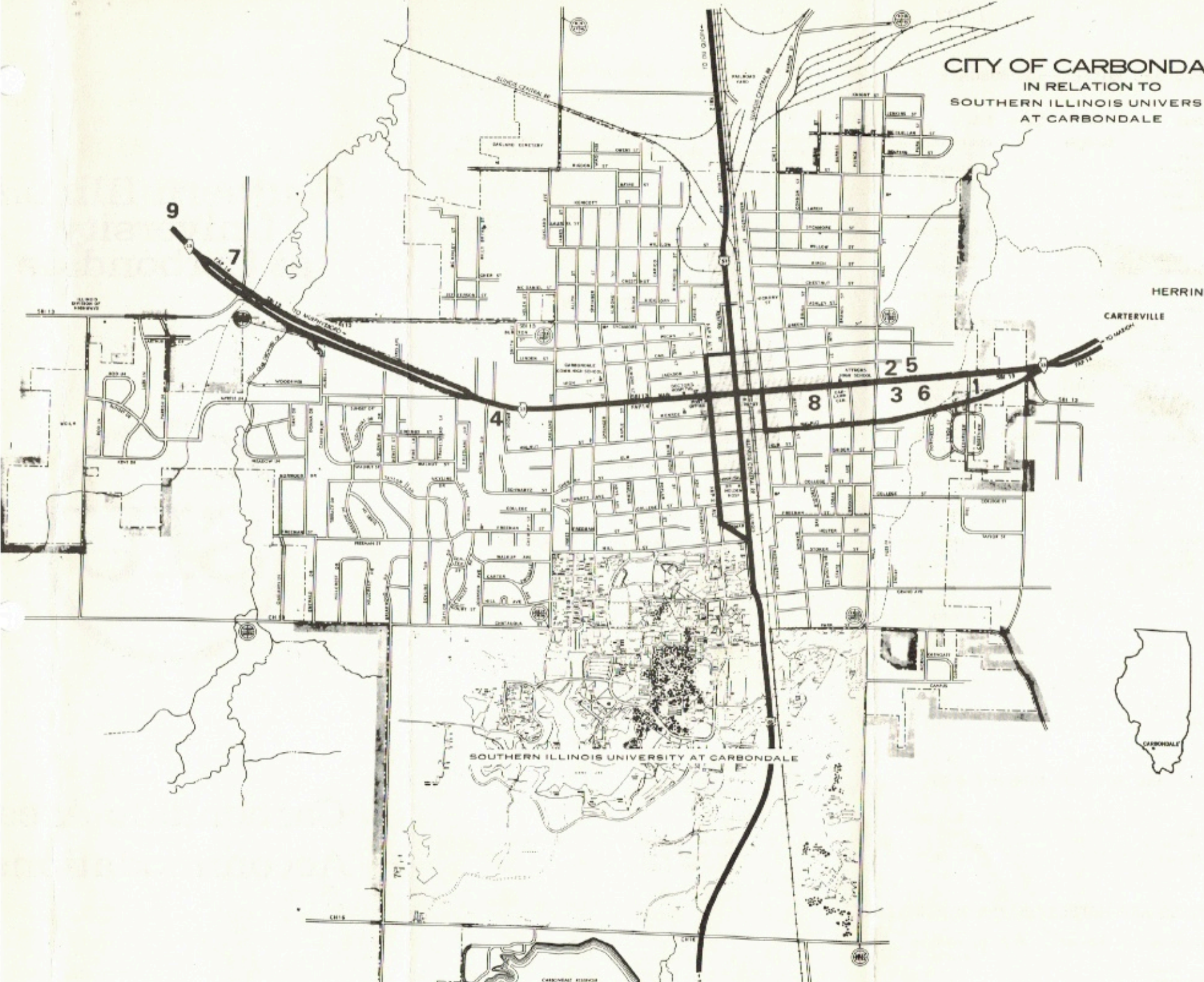

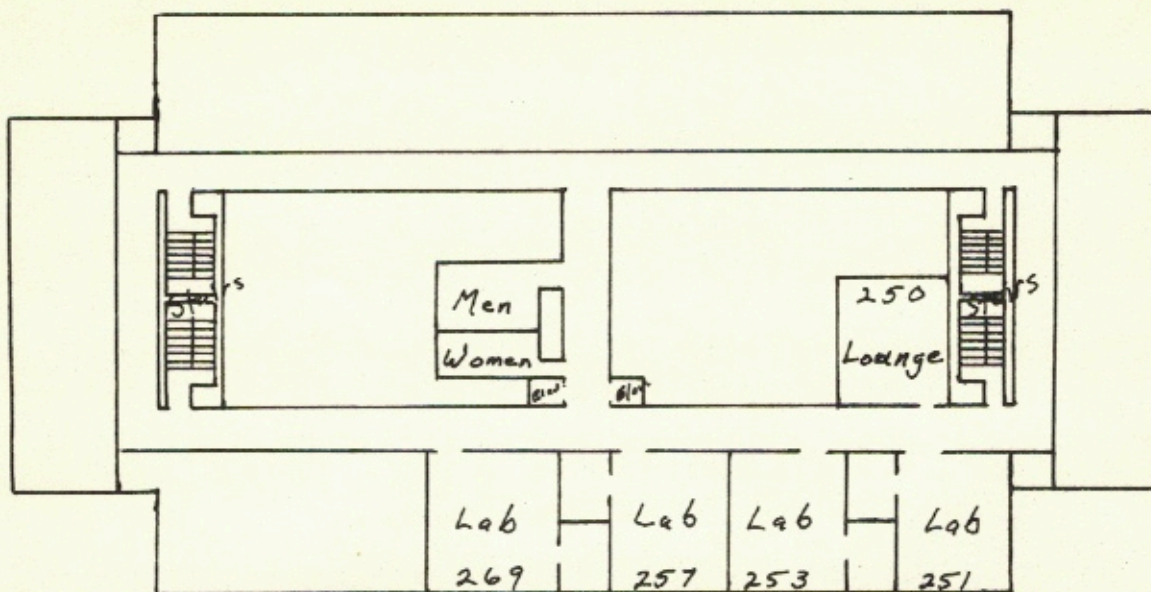

First Floor - Microbiology, Physiology

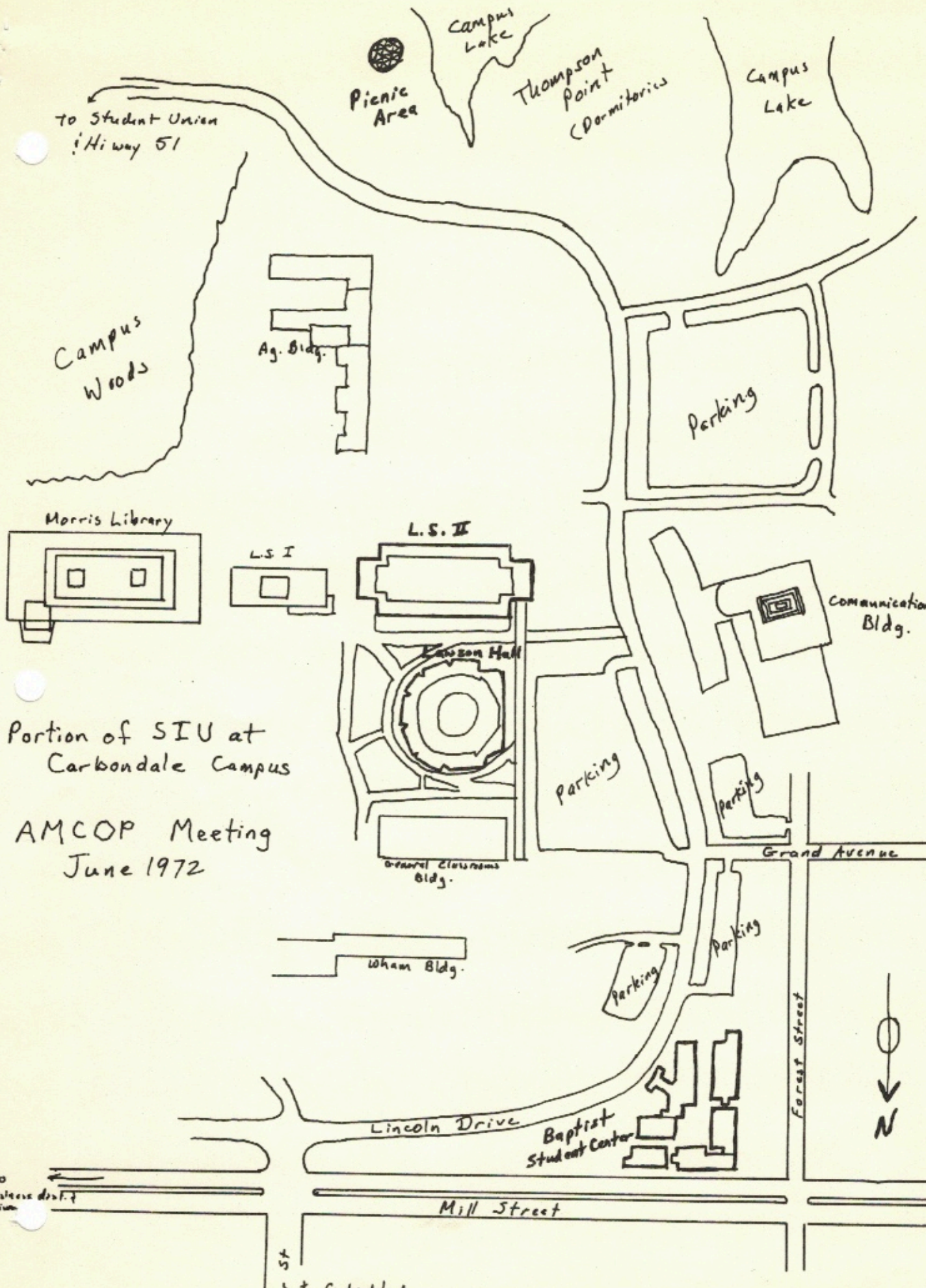
Second Floor - Psychology

MINUTES OF THE 24TH ANNUAL MIDWESTERN CONFERENCE OF PARASITOLOGISTS

June 16-17, 1972

Southern Illinois University - Carbondale

Demonstrations: Eight demonstrations of graduate students' research were exhibited from 1 to 3 P.M. Dr. T. T. Dunagan, in charge of local arrangements, was responsible for supervising the set-up in the new Life Sciences II building. Eighty-five persons (69 registrants) were present.

First business meeting: The meeting was called to order in 101 Lawson Hall at 4:05 P.M. by Presiding Officer Jaskoski. Minutes of the 23rd Conference were read and approved. It was announced that the A.S.P. Council had voted not to extend voting privileges to affiliate organizations. (A.M.C.O.P. had voted in 1971 to favor the extension of voting privileges, as proposed by Dr. George Hunter III.)

Discussion then centered around the best time to hold future A.M.C.O.P. meetings. Duwe moved (Garoian seconded) that the second weekend in June, 1973, be accepted as the meeting time. Motion passed. It was announced that the 1973 meeting would be held at Notre Dame's Convention Center on June 8-9.

The recent death of Prof. Zbigniew Kozar, internationally active Polish parasitologist, was announced by Kruidenier.

Discussion followed on the bylaws and meeting format of A.M.C.O.P. Ulmer moved (Myer seconded) that both these subjects be placed on the agenda for the second business meeting. Motion passed, and the meeting adjourned at 4:45.

Dinner was a delightful cookout at a shelter on the shores of Campus Lake.

Annual address: Prof. Raymond M. Cable spoke on "The Ligher Side of Parasitology". He recited some of his limericks and some anecdotes on famous parasitologists (e.g. Chandler, Herrick, Dolfuss). He then moved into a discussion of the "La Rue System Revisited", treating the phylogeny of cercariae and updating the original scheme (especially regarding hemiurids and didymozoids). He suggested that five structural studies of cercarial bladders might help solve problems of interpretation between epithelial, anepithelial, and secretory types.

C. A. Herrick Award: Dr. Ray Shumard announced that Eain M. Cornford (Iowa State Univ.) was deemed the winner of the C. A. Herrick Award with his demonstration entitled, "Endocrine-Related Variations in Schistosome Development". The judging committee was composed of Drs. Thorson, Todd, and Goodman.

Second business meeting: Presiding Officer Jaskoski called the meeting to order in Room 101 Lawson Hall at 9:10 A.M. and invited the committees to report.

Resolutions Committee (Myer, Nollen chr.)

The Resolutions Committee, on behalf of the 24th A.M.C.O.P., wishes to thank the local committee which includes Dr. Tom Dunagan, Dr. William Dyer, Dr. George Garoian and Dr. Don Miller for making local arrangements to Southern Illinois University at Carbondale, and for providing facilities. We also want to thank Dr. Elbert Hadley, Associate Dean of Liberal Arts and Sciences, for assuming some of the financial responsibilities for the meetings. A special thanks to Mrs. Fern Gregg of the Baptist Student Center for providing housing facilities at a most reasonable cost.

We would also like to express our gratitude to Dr. George Kelley for his efforts in arranging the program. Our appreciation is extended to Dr. Raymond Cable for presenting his stimulating address to the conference.

We convey our thanks to Eli Lilly and Co. for again supporting the annual C. A. Herrick Award and to all the graduate students who presented demonstrations for this important part of our program.

New Business: Considerable discussion revolved around the format of A.M.C.O.P. meetings. Emphasis was placed on continuing the informality and orientation toward graduate student participation. There was sentiment (30-8 "straw vote") to somehow change our current format to foster these goals. James moved (Vande Vusse seconded) that a committee of faculty and graduate students be commissioned to examine the format and report in 1973. Motion passed. Committee appointees were Crites (chairman), Jaskoski, Kelley, Hansen, and Ulmer. This committee was also charged with reviewing A.M.C.O.P.'s geographical boundaries for meeting sites and possible affiliation with other major parasitological groups.

Presiding Officer Jaskoski announced that Ralph Thorson will represent A.M.C.O.P. at the trichinellosis conference.

An ad hoc committee to review and update the bylaws was chartered and consisted of Greve, Cain, and Ulmer (chairman).


Meeting was adjourned at 10:00 A.M.

ANNUAL MIDWESTERN CONFERENCE OF PARASITOLOGISTS

ABSTRACT

The 24th Annual Midwestern Conference of Parasitologists met at Southern Illinois University, Carbondale, on June 16-17, 1972, with 85 registrants present. The 6th annual C. A. Herrick Award was presented to Eain Cornford for excellence in demonstrating his research on endocrine-related variations in schistosome development. The annual address by Dr. Raymond Cable dealt with a revisitation of LaRue's classification system of trematodes. He also suggested areas for further research in this field.

In addition to several scientific exhibits, there was a symposium on programmed instruction in biology, using PLATO as a specific example.

A committee was formed to consider a revision of the Conference's Bylaws. The 25th Conference will be hosted by Notre Dame University. Newly elected officers for 1972-73 are Dr. R. F. Shumard, Presiding Officer, and Dr. R. E. Thorson, Program Officer. Dr. J. H. Greve remains as Secretary-Treasurer.

ANNUAL MIDWESTERN CONFERENCE OF PARASITOLOGISTS

REPORT TO COUNCIL, AMERICAN SOCIETY OF PARASITOLOGISTS

The 24th Annual Midwestern Conference of Parasitologists met at the Carbondale campus of Southern Illinois University on June 16 and 17, 1972. Dr. T. T. Dunagan and his associates were in charge of local arrangements. The 85 registrants were treated to eight fine scientific demonstrations exhibited by graduate students. The topics ranged from effects of endocrine function on parasites to biochemical assays of parasite tissues to electron micrographic studies.

The 6th annual C. A. Herrick Award, underwritten by Eli Lilly and Co., was won by Eain Cornford (Iowa State University) for his demonstrations, "Endocrine-related variations in schistosome development". The selection of this award was made by a committee composed of Drs. Thorson, Todd, and Goodman.

Dr. Raymond Cable presented the main address, which was in two parts: a humorous set of limericks and anecdotes followed by a discussion of the LaRue system of classification revisited. He suggested that future studies on cercariae, using the electron microscope, might aid in sorting out bladder types (epithelial, anepithelial and secretory).




