

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ANNUAL MIDWESTERN CONFERENCE OF PARASITOLOGISTS Report to Council, American Society of Parasitologists

The 27th Annual Midwestern Conference of Parasitologists was held at Iowa State University on June 6-7, 1975. Dr. M. J. Ulmer and associates were in charge of the local arrangements.

The 90 registrants took in 20 demonstrations and 7 papers on various parasitological topics. The C. A. Herrick Award, given to that graduate student who best displays his research, was won by Darwin Wittrock (Iowa State University) for his display entitled "Histochemical and ultrastructural studies on the ventral papillae of the notocotylid trematode Quinqueserialis quinqueserialis". This was the ninth time that the Herrick Award, sponsored by Eli Lilly & Company, has been given. A new award, named in honor of George R. LaRue, was developed for the best oral presentation. The winner of the LaRue Award was Valerie Nelson (Iowa State University) for her paper entitled "Cell adherence reactions to Ascaris suum; characterization of the fluid component". It is hoped that the LaRue Award will take its place alongside the Herrick Award as an annual feature of the conference.

Another feature of the 27th AMCOP was a special recognition of Raymond M. Cable (Purdue University) for his many years of contribution to the science and art of parasitology in the Midwest. Several of his graduate students were on hand to reflect upon the life of a graduate student under Dr. Cable. Dr. Paul M. Nollen, a student of Dr. Cable, gave the main address on "Studies on the reproductive systems of parasitic flatworms, or all you wanted to know about sex in worms and were afraid to ask", in which he demonstrated that selfing is a variable, but common, act among the platyhelminths he studied.

The 28th meeting will be held at the University of Nebraska, Lincoln, and Dr. Mary Lou Pritchard as host.

Herrick Award was won by Darwin Wittrock for excellence in demonstrating his research in histochemical and ultrastructural studies on Quinqueserialis quinqueserialis. The first annual G. R. LaRue Award was presented to Valerie Nelson for her excellent oral presentation of research on the cell adherence reaction.

Dr. Raymond M. Cable was given special recognition for his many years of contribution to parasitology in the Midwest. Several of his former students were on hand.

New officers elected were J. H. Greve, Presiding Officer; Mary Lou Pritchard, Program Officer; and W. H. Coil, Secretary-Treasurer. The 28th meeting will be at Lincoln, Nebraska.

ANNUAL MIDWESTERN CONFERENCE OF PARASITOLOGISTS

Report to Council, American Society of Parasitologists

The 28th Annual Midwestern Conference of Parasitologists was held at University of Nebraska on May 28-29, 1976. Mary Lou Pritchard and associates were in charge of the local arrangements.

Seventy-four registrants attended the meetings which had six demonstrations and fifteen papers (oral presentations) Friday afternoon and Saturday morning. Dr. Arlie C. Todd gave the banquet address: "A Redifinition of Subclinical Parasitism--and its impact on world politics."

The Herrick Award was supported for the 10th year by Eli Lilly for \$200. The LaRue Award is only two years old; it was supported this year for the first time by Ann Arbor Biological Supply for \$100. Two additional awards were financed from funds raised by the local committee: the Manter Award (\$25) and the Ward Award (\$25).

The winners were:

- W. L. Current (Herrick Award), "Sporogenic Cycle of <u>Henneguya</u> exilis in the channel catfish."
- C. A. Klucas (LaRue Award), "Hatching Fluid of Ascaris suum used as an immunizing agent in pigs."
- W. L. Current (Ward Award) and B. M. Christensen (Manter Award) were the second-place winners in each category.

The 29th meeting will be held at Kansas State University in the new veterinary medicine facility on June 10 and 11, 1977.
